

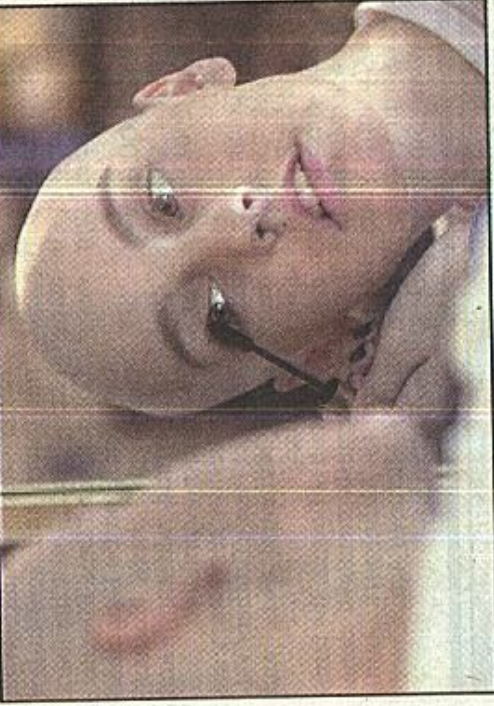
Burbank High sophomore is 'one tough cookie'

MEDIA DISTRICT NORTH — The hardest thing for Adrienne Wilson to deal with is that she might have contracted Hepatitis B and C while just a fetus in her mother's womb.

Adrienne, a 15-year-old sophomore at Burbank High School with a 4.0 grade-point average, was diagnosed in May with hepatocellular carcinoma — a rare liver cancer among young adults that has a direct correlation to Hepatitis

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tracted Hepatitis B and C while in her mother's womb. And although Adrienne's condition is stable, any patient undergoing chemotherapy is under major risk of infection.

Since she was 8, Adrienne has been taken care of by her 28-year-old sister Andrea.

"Anyone who knows Adrienne knows she is one tough cookie," Andrea said. "If she hadn't gone through such a rough childhood, I don't know if she would have handled this as well as she has."

Andrea recently took Adrienne — a fan of music and dance — to a performance of "Giselle," a ballet Adrienne had been looking forward to for weeks and almost missed due to an emergency trip to the hospital the night before.

Adrienne takes about 16

pills each day, some which make her nauseated, and she receives shots every morning to keep her white blood cell count up.

No matter what has been thrown her way, Adrienne has big plans for the future.

"I'm looking forward to going to college to study zoology and religion," she said.
